RESEARCH PROGRAMS

News Quality (Journalist's Resource)

A well-informed citizenry is essential for a healthy democracy. But are today's news sources providing the information, analysis, and context needed to help Americans make informed decisions? As newsrooms shrink, journalists struggle to build expertise in the wide variety of topics they often are called on to cover. Journalist's Resource is a project of the Shorenstein Center aimed at bridging the gap between journalism and academia. Its primary goal is helping journalists improve their work by relying more often on scientific evidence and high-quality, peer-reviewed research.

Led by Dr. Joan Donovan (@BostonJoan), The Technology and Social Change Project (TaSC) explores how media manipulation is a means to control public conversation, derail democracy, and disrupt society. TaSC conducts research, develops methods, and facilitates workshops for journalists, policy makers, technologists, and civil society organizations on how to detect, document, and debunk media manipulation campaigns.

A handful of large digital platforms dominate the public space online. Every day, these platforms make decisions on a range of issues that affect the public sphere—including misinformation, hate speech, and digital advertising. The world's leading technology firms – most of which are U.S. companies – today operate in a largely unregulated environment. The Digital Platforms & Democracy Project at the Shorenstein Center aims to address these issues through expert analysis, research, and convenings of policy makers and experts in the field.

Apart from the major national newspapers like the New York Times and the Washington Post, the traditional business models for local journalism have collapsed, and most of the current revenue models in the industry are unsustainable. The News Sustainability program produces original research on sustainable business models for the digital age, and works closely with legacy and emerging news organizations to put the theories into practice—creating a cycle of research, implementation, and learning.

Institutional Antiracism and Accountability Project

The Institutional Antiracism and Accountability (IARA) Project is an initiative directed by Khalil Gibran Muhammad, Professor of History, Race, and Public Policy at Harvard Kennedy School and the Suzanne Young Murray Professor at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Studies. The goal of this enterprise is to use research and policy to promote anti-racism as a core value and institutional norm. To this end, IARA proposes to further explore and examine how understanding and engaging with institutional history impacts organizations when forging a path forward for equity. While the field of racial equity and anti-racism is not new, it remains underdeveloped within the context of applied knowledge and pedagogy for organizational behavior and institutional change.
